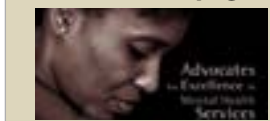

Terminal 3 ready for take-off

Fewer than two weeks remain, and the impressive 1.9 million square foot Terminal Three at McCarran International Airport will be open for business.

The \$2.4 billion terminal boasts seven international gates, seven domestic gates, 32 curbside check-in systems, 130 inside the lobby and nearly 6,000 parking spaces spanning over eight levels. Flight operations begin June 27th, and with strong congestion at Terminal One, the opening couldn't come at a better time.

"Terminal Three's opening will relieve congestion during peak periods at Terminal One, whether that congestion occurs on the roadways, curbsides, the ticketing lobby or security checkpoints," says Chris Jones, Public Affairs &

Marketing Manager for McCarran. "Currently, more than 90 percent of McCarran's passengers go through Terminal One. With T3, we will be able to balance out those peaks thanks to the flexibility of having two terminals, each capable of handling a

large volume of travelers."

Visitors will discover improved amenities, including more sit-down restaurants and stores (everything from Carl's Jr. and Burger King to a luxurious, on-demand express spa service) as well "T3" continued on page 2

Laughlin denied incorporation

A proposal for Laughlin, Nev. to become incorporated was defeated at the polls this week. Residents of this tourist town decided on the measure on June 12th, and voters in opposition prevailed over the ones in support of it. The final score showed 962 votes against incorporation and only 729 in favor. At day's end, ballots cast totaled 1691, a number that represented a turnout of sixty percent of the 2,700 registered voters in town.

Those in the losing minority still managed to get 43 percent of the vote, a figure that will likely encourage them to try again in the future. Cityhood for Laughlin was a heated issue leading up to the voting this week, with

both sides fervently arguing for and against it. Proponents of the measure claimed that Clark County Government Centers, located in downtown Las Vegas, are just too far and out of reach for the reality of daily life in Laughlin.

For example, under the current status, a resident of Laughlin who needs a building permit has to make the nearly two-hour, 100-mile long drive to Las Vegas. The same rings true if a meeting

with an elected official is in order, because bureaucrats operate from the central outposts located in Las Vegas.

On the other hand, opponents feared that if Laughlin became an incorporated entity, it would not have sufficient resources to pay the bills and exist on its own. They argued that in case of failure, the State would take over the town's finances and a raise in property taxes would "Laughlin" continued on page 3

Scientists find outerspace tropical lake: Saturn’s moon Titan has lake filled with methane

The existence of lakes on
Saturn’s biggest moon,
Titan, is not news. We have
known about lakes near
the poles for a while, but
scientists have just dis-
covered another lake near
the equator. This shallow,

hydrocarbon lake meas-
ures 927 square miles, and
there are four small ponds
around it.

This is a startling dis-
covery because this lake is
full of liquid methane, and
scientists speculated that
lakes of methane near the
equator of Titan would
be unstable due to the

heat from the Sun as such
a latitude. It is often hot
enough for the substance to
evaporate.

Scientists think that an
underground source of
methane may be what is
keeping the supply in the
lake so rich. This could
explain the methane-rich
atmosphere that Titan

maintains.

A water cycle similar to
Earth’s could also be oc-
curring on Titan with the
methane. It could be evapo-
rating from the tropical
lake and then raining into
the lakes toward the poles,
where it is cool enough
for the methane to stay in
liquid form.

likely follow. They pointed out the recent
ruling in the Nevada Legislature in which
lawmakers opted to leave the Laughlin “strip”
out of the incorporation proposal. Therefore,
it is unclear whether the hypothetical city
to-be could support itself without the cash
flow in tax revenue from the casino resorts.

Laughlin is a true desert oasis, a small town
of 7,000 people sitting in the Valley of the
Colorado River. The resort town boasts an
impressive 2.3 million visitors per year, and it
hosts big annual events such as the Laughlin
Regatta and the Laughlin River Run, a mo-
torcycle enthusiasts’ gathering. It has its own
international airport, golf courses, gambling
and dining amenities, shows, and miles of
river for sports and fun on the water. Ac-
cording to the local Chamber of Commerce,
close to six percent of the gaming revenue
Clark County receives is generated there.

The town prides itself in being a cheaper
alternative to Las Vegas; Laughlin is a des-
tination where visitors still gamble, or enjoy
a good dinner and show on a low budget.
However, not everything in Laughlin is
about casinos and gaming. This enclave in
the Mohave also offers opportunities to ex-
plore wildlife, like hiking and bird watch-
ing. In addition, there are nearby attractions
such as famous Route 66, or the old west
town of Oatman, in bordering Arizona.

Perhaps being remote and removed
from a big metropolis like Las Vegas is not
a bad thing. Residents here treasure the
clean, crisp air that lets them enjoy a blue
sky during the day and the opportunity to
gaze at the stars at night. Maybe the resi-
dents here like it that way, and the long trips
for official business come with the living.

Whether the battle for incorporation will
come back later or not remains to be seen.
Judging by the attention and news the is-
sue brought forward, it is evident that both
sides had valid reasons to push for their
causes. For now though, it is time for the
residents to leave differences behind, and
get back to working together. Laughlin’s
reputation for being fun, friendly and af-
fordable has been rightfully earned, and it
is up to the community to keep it that way.

Delegates head to Tampa to sue GOP

Over 120 Delegates to the
Republican National Con-
vention are suing the GOP
to be free from voting for
Romney on the first ballot
for Presidential Nominee
and are arguing that they
have been illegally coerced
into choosing Mitt Romney
for the party’s presidential
nominee and demand-
ing they be “unbound” to
vote for another candidate
instead.

The federal lawsuit, filed
this week in U.S. Dis-
trict Court in California
demands the delegates
be freed to “vote their
conscience” for presi-
dential nominee at the party’s
August national convention
in Tampa, Fla., rather than
being “bound” to vote for a
certain candidate, as many
state party bylaws require,
based on the primary elec-
tions and other delegate
selection procedures.
Courthouse News Service
reports at least another 40
additional national conven-
tion delegates have asked

to join the lawsuit which
would bring the total to 160
Delegates.

The delegates claim the
party violated federal law by
forcing them to sign loyalty
affidavits, under threat of
perjury, to vote for Mitt
Romney, though he is not
yet the official nominee.

“They don’t want to be
bound to any candidate, or
even be forced to vote for
the nominee,” Richard Gil-
bert, of Gilbert & Marlowe,
attorney for the delegates,
told Courthouse News. “To
have a real convention, the
delegates must have free
will so that when they meet,
they can persuade each
other and then decide who
to vote for.”

The courts have typically
allowed political parties
leeway in the nomination
of their candidates, but
this case asks the court to
consider the choice of presi-
dential nominee a “federal
election,” subject to laws
that would free delegates
from party procedures
to vote their conscience.
Beyond merely asserting
delegates’ “right” to vote

their conscience, however,
the lawsuit asserts the GOP
has engaged in a racket-
eering-like scheme to push
Romney as the candidate.

“The Republican National
Committee and its chair-
man have been aiding
the Governor Romney
campaign for at least six
months,” the lawsuit asserts.
“The RNC and its chairman,
defendant Reince Priebus,
have ... combined with a
particular candidate with
all of the aid the RNC can
possibly, but improperly
give ... to obstruct, intimi-
date and harass delegates
from voting their con-
science.”

Specifically, the lawsuit
charges Republican officials
and operatives have used
threats of violence, certified
unlawful slates of delegates,
demanded affidavits of
loyalty to Romney under
penalty of perjury and have
even altered ballot results
to make sure the national
convention is stacked with
delegates who will vote for
Romney

Working with a professional service provider

Even though I provide professional services as an attorney, I have had my own problems when I needed to hire a doctor, an accountant and even another attorney. People providing professional services usually charge by the hour, and their hourly rate can be mind-boggling. Here are some tips to cope with working with someone when you need professional services.

Be Prepared
Most professionals need specific information when they meet someone for the first time, and many need specific information every time they meet with a client. Find out what that information is and bring it with you to your meeting with the professional.

Many professionals specialize in a narrow field in which they have a lot of expertise. Don't consult a neurologist that specializes in Alzheimer's disease, as I once did, for advice about a seizure disorder or a brain

injury. No matter how smart the professional is, outside of their field, they are just another person. Use the Internet to research the qualifications of the professional. Nothing will make you appear to be a bigger idiot than asking someone who has handled thousands of a particular kind of case than the ques-

tion, "How many cases have you handled like mine?" Professionals with lots of experience don't keep count of the number of cases they have handled, but someone with nearly no experience always does.

Make a list of your questions, but let the professional control the conversation. I can't give someone an answer to a specific question without first knowing more about the particulars of their circumstances. But it is a fairly

have and to answer them without the client needing to ask.

Be Honest.
Professionals often rely on what you tell them, especially during your first meeting. If you only provide part of the story or fudge some of the facts, it will catch up with you sooner or later. After all, the accountant will get your financial records, your attorney can pull your police report or other "due diligence" records, and your

doctor will order more tests. Once the professional notices that you are less than truthful about your circumstances, one of two things will probably happen - you will either be dropped as a client or the fees will go up and up and up as the professional searches for the answers that you failed to truthfully provide. Don't worry that the truth will turn off the professional from helping you. Professional service providers are usually accustomed to unpleasant facts since people with no problems seldom consult professional service providers.

Uncomfortable?
It's okay to walk away. Sometimes the rapport is just not there. If you are not comfortable with a professional, trust your gut instincts and find someone else. Both you and the professional service provider will be better off if you follow your instincts and work with someone you can trust with your secrets. It doesn't mean that the professional is bad and it doesn't mean "Service" continued on page 6

to certify the vote count, and for that he got thrown off the convention.

The plaintiffs are asking the court to order the RNC to inform delegates they can vote for the nominee of their choice, to reinstate delegates who lost their seats at the convention because they refused to sign loyalty affidavits and to recount ballots by hand

or hold another convention in areas "where the sanctity of the ballots are untrustworthy."

Yet striking down party rules that bind candidates to vote in accordance with the primary process could suddenly open up the nomination to another campaign season, as presidential hopefuls could attempt to sway the elected

delegates to their side, a potentiality Gilbert recognizes.

"If the judge rules in our favor, I won't be surprised if three or four new candidates, say Sarah Palin, jump in and say they want to be considered," Gilbert told Courthouse News.

"It will be the most interesting national convention in my lifetime if the judge rules for us on this."

March 1, 2012, Arizona Sheriff Joe Arpaio’s press conference: Arpaio announces that after an extensive seven month study, his experts have found Barack Obama’s birth

Anyway, here I am reading, enjoying and loving the characters. The night before had turned into a long one as sometimes happens when you are coming to the end of a good book. I’m starting to feel that now as

my eyelids are getting a little heavy. A little head-jerk upward a couple of times, and then I guess I was gone. Looking back now, I must have looked like the town drunk who came in for a place to sleep. What the heck. Drunks have to sleep too.

I remember the blissful silence; then I heard some people talking. No, this couldn’t be. That’s Harry the Horse. I just knew it was him because that’s how



After nearly a year of anticipation, the Electric Daisy Carnival finally returned to desert soil, and I couldn't have been any more excited to participate. This excitement would soon be converted to various reactions to chaos and disappointment, but we will take it one step at a time.



On Friday, after leaving the house and making our way down the highway, it soon became apparent that I-15 North was going to be our enemy if we didn't escape it soon enough, and we thought we had by getting off at Cheyenne and getting onto Las Vegas Boulevard. But soon enough, the traffic jams were engulfing every possible entrance to the Las Vegas Motor Speedway, and after hours of bumper-to-bumper crawling, we were finally ready to get in line. We got in rather smoothly and still in high spirits, despite missing several acts we were looking forward to seeing, and were posted up at the Circuit Grounds stage in time to see an act that has a very deep place in my heart: Gabriel & Dresden. They played one of the best sets I have ever seen in my life, and the truth of that remained steadfast

Weekly Recipe

Banana Bread

Instructions:

1. Preheat the oven to 300 degrees Fahrenheit. Coat two loaf pans with butter and cinnamon sugar and set aside.
2. Mash bananas and mix with cinnamon, vanilla extract, eggs, and sour cream.
3. Cream together sugar, butter and honey in a large bowl.
4. Add the banana mixture to the sugar mixture and combine well.
5. Mix salt, baking soda and flour. Slowly add to the banana mixture until all the flour is integrated.
6. Pour half of the mix into each pan and place in the oven.
7. All ovens vary, so start with a 60 minute timer. After that, check the bread at least every twenty minutes, rotating the pans as necessary to cause even browning. It's done when a tooth pick can slide cleanly in and out of the bread.
8. Use a knife to loosen the bread from the sides of the pan, and allow the loaves to cool on a cooling rack. Slice and serve.

This banana bread is a huge hit in my house. The secret is the cinnamon sugar crust and the small amount of sour cream for that moist interior. Sour cream may seem like an odd ingredient to add, but it puts this banana bread over the top. Whether you eat it plain or warm with a little butter, this banana bread is a delicious comfort-food treat. These loaves are great for gift giving if you can keep your household off of them long enough to wrap!

Makes: 2 loaves in 9" x 4" pans. Different sized pans will need different baking times.

Ingredients:

1/4 cup white sugar mixed with 1 tsp cinnamon to coat
pan

- 1 tbs butter to grease pans
- 2 tbs honey
- 2 and 3/4 cups white sugar
- 3/4 cups butter
- 3 eggs
- 9 mashed bananas
- 1 cup sour cream
- 2 tsp vanilla extract
- 2 tsp cinnamon
- 1/2 tsp salt
- 3 tsp baking soda
- 4 1/2 cups all purpose flour

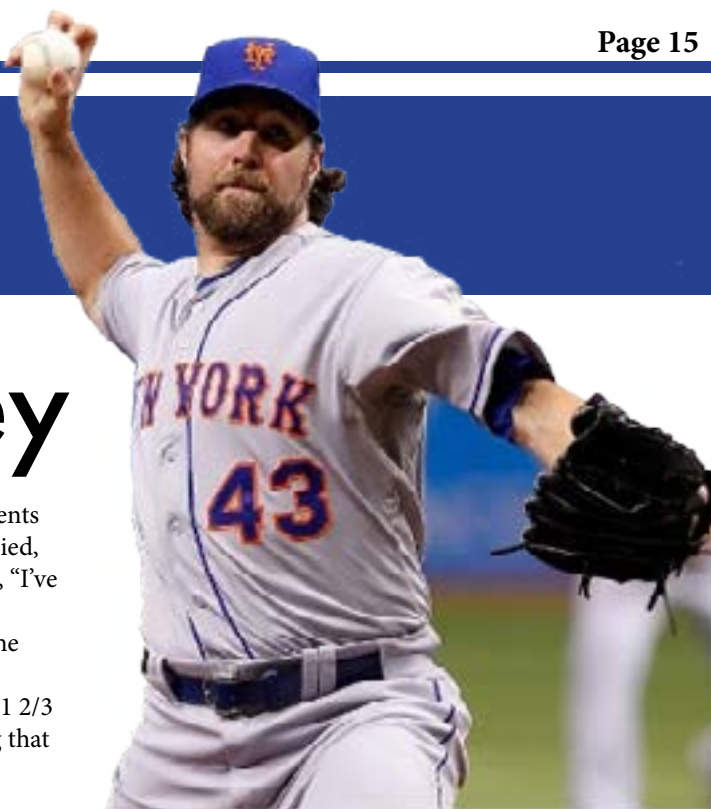


Mets Pitcher R.A. Dickey throws one-hitter

Close only counts in horseshoes and hand grenades. New York Mets pitcher R.A. Dickey almost did it again for the Mets, coming within one play of a no hitter and two plays of a perfect game, on Wednesday night in Tampa, FL. Unfortunately, “almost” doesn’t count. However, Dickey allowed only an infield single to B.J. Upton, which should have been scored an error, on his way to his second career one-hitter while breaking the franchise record for consecutive scoreless innings in a 9-1 victory over the Tampa Bay Rays on Wednesday night.

When queried about his team’s curious state of events recently, New York Mets manager Terry Collins replied, “We were two plays from a perfect game,” and added, “I’ve seen a lot of games, but I’ve never seen a perfecto.” Dickey pitched 32 2/3 scoreless innings, besting the record by one inning. Jerry Koosman had held the franchise-record of 31 2/3 consecutive scoreless innings for 39 years, achieving that feat way back in in 1973. Collins said the team would appeal the scoring of the first inning single, but realized the league probably wouldn’t change it. “We said in the ninth inning that we’ve got to appeal that play. We’re probably not going to win it, but ... what the heck,” added a frazzled Collins. “What have you got to lose except to have somebody say no?” Pitcher Johan Santana takes the mound this afternoon as the Mets try to sweep the Rays at Tropicana Field at 1:10 p.m. (ET)

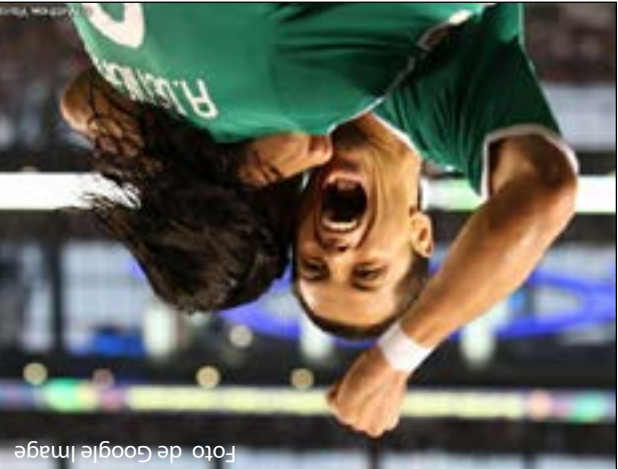
